- Creation of Kindergarten classes
- Child labor laws
- Public health service
- Hot and healthy lunch programs
- Juvenile justice system
- Mandatory immunization
- Arts in Education
- School Safety

Locally, the advocacy efforts of engaged citizens have brought about significant improvements to education. As the timeline illustrates, it is the advocacy work of everyday folks that has made a real difference in the lives of California's kids.


## **History of PTA Advocacy Day for Education**

The first Advocacy Day took place in 1980. It was prompted by the passage of Proposition 13 and its anticipated negative impact on education. Advocacy Day founding leader, Gwen Regalia, worked with a small group of dedicated volunteers to convince people to take a bus to Sacramento and meet face to face with local legislators to advocate for education.

Today, our advocacy continues. We now meet locally and our legislators come to us. It sometimes feels as though our advocacy through the years has been centered on finances. Since California consistently ranks among the bottom five states in the nation in per pupil funding, there has been a great need for advocacy around the issue of funding. However, our advocacy efforts over three decades have also focused on issues of education reform, class size, standardized testing, special needs and children's health issues.

The Legislative Committees of local PTA councils plan and execute Advocacy Day on behalf of their respective councils. After years of empowering PTA volunteers to advocate, local PTAs have become strong partners with their school districts in ensuring access to quality programs and facilities for their students.

In addition to influencing our legislators, Advocacy Day also serves as a vehicle for informing PTA volunteers and community members. Often, the idea of advocacy can be intimidating. By putting on this annual event, we hope to make the idea of advocacy accessible to everyone. Thank you for attending and carrying on this important work.
